

How did our 4-Way Test get its start?

One of the most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics in the world is the Rotary Four-Way Test.

It was created by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor in 1932 when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy. Taylor looked for a way to save the struggling company mired in depression-caused financial difficulties. He drew up a 24-word code of ethics for all employees to follow in their business and professional lives.

The Four-Way Test was adopted by Rotary in 1943 and has been translated into more than 100 languages and published in thousands of ways.

It is repeated each week by members of the Fayetteville Rotary Club as they get their meeting underway.

The Four-Way Test (of the Things We Think, Say or Do) -1) Is it the truth; 2) Is it fair to all concerned; 3) Will it build goodwill and better friendships; and 4) Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Club's first project was modern telephone service

At one of its earliest meetings, in March 1935, the Fayetteville Rotary Club began pursuit of having a "flashlight telephone system" installed in Lincoln County.

The club petitioned the mayor and city board to authorize the change and agreed to take a census of telephone subscribers to see if the change was desired.

The change from the magneto type to common battery would require the telephone company, Southern Bell T and T, to either build or lease another building for their central office and also remove telephone poles from the square.

In addition to the city board having to approve the change, the request also went before the Tennessee railroad and public utilities commission.
